The door on the fabulous summer months has sadly quietly closed as the first day of Autumn heralded the incoming season with a dose of typicaly autumnal rain!

Confirmed by the Met Office, this summer has been the hottest on records, and we have all enjoyed many months of consistantly warm and lovely days and evenings.

The Summer has provided us with some great opportunties for wonderful fun run outs and meet ups and there has been plently of activity over the season withing the BCCC keeping the membership happy and non rebelious!

Our activities and events go from strength to strength as we constantly strive to ensure the club calender is kept full for all to enjoy as much time as possible in our beloved wheels and the company of the membership.

So as we move into the autumn here are some completely random and useless summery anecdotes to marvel and muse over:

1. Dog days of summer

The phrase 'dog days of summer' used to refer to sweltering summer days has more to do with the stars than dogs. The Roman's 'dies caniculares' began towards the end of July when the star Sirius (known as the Dog Star) began to rise in the sky just before the Sun. The star was so bright that the Romans believed it gave extra heat to the sun and was responsible for hot days in summer.

2. It's the most thundery time of the year

More thunderstorms occur during the summer than at any other time of the year. The warmth of summer often provides the perfect conditions of rising air and moisture required for the creation of thunderstorms. In the UK, they are most likely to occur in the East Midlands and the southeast.

3. Crickets get Chirpy

Forget your smart phone thermometers, next time you hear crickets chirping on a balmy summer evening, why not try this cool and simple method to find out the temperature.

The frequency of a cricket's chirps is consistent with air temperature, so you simply need to count how many chirps there are over 25 seconds then divide by 3 and add 4 to tell you the temperature in Celsius!

Grasshoppers may work as well 😂





4. Snow in June

On 2nd June 1975, snow showers forced the abandonment of several cricket matches across the country. The coldest temperature ever recorded in summer in the UK was -5.6 °C recorded on 9 June 1955 in Dalwhinnie (somewhere north of Watford!) and again on 1st and 3rd June 1962 in Santon Downham in Norfolk.

5. Height of Summer

Did you know that on a very hot day in Paris, the Eiffel Tower grows taller? The tower is constructed from hundreds of tons of iron/steel and when this is warmed it expands, causing the structure to grow by up to 17 cm. same situation also applies to Crystal Palace.

6. First day of Summer

This year the astronomical summer began on 21 June. The astronomical calendar determines the different seasons due to the 23.5 degrees of tilt of the Earth's axis, in its orbit around the Sun.

The meteorological summer began on 1 June. The meteorological seasons are split into three months each. They coincide with our use of the Gregorian calendar (Pope Greg X111), making it easier for observing and forecasting to compare seasonal and monthly statistics.

7. Manhattan Henge

Twice a year around 28 May and 12 July, New York is subject to a fascinating sunset phenomenon.

Owing to the city's design on a grid, rotated 29 degrees clockwise from true east-west, twice a year the Sun sets directly at the end of the many of New York's major streets. This creates a spectacular sunset seeing the Sun slightly above the horizon and nestled between the rows of buildings.

Not to be upstaged similarly, Milton Keynes' central road is designed so that when the Sun rises on the solstice, it shines straight down Midsummer Boulevard and reflects in the glass of the train station.

8. Top Temperatures

The warmest ever summer in the UK was in 2018 when daytime temperatures averaged 15.76°C, narrowingly exceeding the previous record of 15.75°C in 2006.

The hottest daily temperature ever recorded in the UK was on 19 July 2022 when in Coningsby, Lincolnshire, recorded a sweltering 40.3°C.

9. The longest day of the year is in summer

The summer solstice marks the point when the Sun reaches its highest point in the sky. This is the longest day of the year and after this point, the days slowly begin to get shorter until the winter solstice which occurs around 21 December. Oh happy days! At the same time as the Northern Hemisphere experiences the summer solstice, the Southern Hemisphere has a winter solstice marking the shortest day of the year.





10.Summer Party time

Summer is also the best outdoor parteee time! Our gardens are at their best, the country is buzzing with festivals /car shows, strawberries and cream trump stodgy crumbles and custard! BBQ, s are obviously mandatory!and beer and wine always taste better!!

The goalkeeper, Hannah Hampton, was magnificent and made all the right saves in the right order and the final penalty kick of the game was given to the inimitable Chloe Kelly who powered the ball into the top right and the victory was England's!!

Cricket /England/India Test Match Series 2025



The five-match Test series kicked off on Friday, June 20, with the first game being held in Leeds. The final Test is set to wrap up by August 4th. All five matches will began at 3:30 PM. The matches took place at 5 grounds: Headingley Leeds, Egbaston Birmingham, Lords London, Old Trafford Manchester and the Oval London. After a great tournament played through late June/July the magnificent India secured a nervejangling, six-run victory over the excellent England in one of the most dramatic conclusions in Test match history with a staggering finish at The Kia Oval.





This remarkable game was made even more astonishing as the amazing Chris Woakes headed out to bat with his arm in a sling! as the series finally ended 2-2 after six weeks of pulsating and glorious top class Test cricket.

On 22nd July came the passing of monster rock star Ozzy Osbourne - the Prince of Darkness of Black Sabbath fame.

For the younger members of BCCC this popular beat combo and eventually huge rock band came to fame in 1969/70 with their eponymous Black Sabbath album and with the subsequent follow ups Paranoid and Masters of Reality Albums, they set the benchmark for this genre, the rest being history...

BCCC Summer events /runs:

Moving on now to more relevant BCCC ramblings, below is a smorgasbord of the season's main events:

Bentley Priory run out 14th June

A Club outing was arranged to visit this historic site in Stanmore; the visit included a guided tour of the site and a light lunch in the lovely basement café and terrace area











The site has a long and fascinating history. Built basically as it now stands in 1788, designed by the Architect Sir John Soane (he of Bank of England fame) it remained in private hands with further extensions and additions over the subsequent years until it eventually closed down in early 20,s after a period as a hotel and eventually a girl's school.

The Air Ministry bought part of the site in 1926 and as the RAF expanded in 1936 Fighter Command was formed and operationally based from here. The RAF became the buildings longest resident eventually moving out in 2008.

RAF Bentley Priory played a pivotal role during the Battle of Britain as Headquarters Fighter Command. From this location the Battle of Britain was planned and controlled being one of the most the most decisive battles during World War II, fought in the skies above Britain between 10 July and 31 October 1940. The inspirational speech line "Never was so much owed by so many to so few" from a speech by PM Winston Churchill was in direct reference to the RAF,S astonishing efforts. Had the Battle been lost, Britain would have almost certainly been invaded by Nazi Germany.

Our run out, not as dramatic, started out on a beautiful sunny day from our base at the Woodman in Water End, with a pleasant drive down through Shenley and Radlett arriving at Bently Priory some 45mins later. We were given very special parking arrangements displaying our cars at the front of the house and in front the Battle of Britain lawn displays of a Spitfire and Hurricane.

The pre-arranged guided tour was excellent and lasted around an hour, highly recommended as the detailed and explanations of the sites history were both fascinating and informative.

Following our tour, we had a lovely lunch pre-arranged in the Basement restaurant and terrace area and were then free to explore further including the magnificent Italianate gardens and grounds.

A big thanks to Marty for arranging this great visit...... A must return venue!













The East Barnet Festival - Cars in the Park 6th July

BCCCBC (Book Club) Literary Corner

At the Car show in May a local enthusiast Feroze Engineer approached BCCC and handed over a couple of copies of his book "It can't See you in the Dark" for any of us to read and maybe review.

So a couple of us have read this derring do tale and I can say it is definitely a page turner!

The book is basically running two stories in parallel which eventually meet and combine in the second half /final chapters.

Set around events in Baghdad on the brink of war, and centred around the pretty evil Saddam Hussein regime and his disparate family, on one level a local anti-government blogger is risking life and limb in broadcasting truths about the state of his beloved country whilst another entirely unconnected scheme is being plotted by external govt agencies to infiltrate the regime from afar and rolled into all this the key character is a major petrol head and car thief!!

The opportunity to steal some of the most valuable cars in the world from the vast Hussein collection is irresistible to the character and so the story twists and turns and unfolds in a daring and gripping adventure.

It is fictional as such but there are some factual truths wrapped up in the text, and some characters are loosely based on real people and conversations and scenarios prevailing at the time.

Some of the book is disturbing and with violent undertones probably not far off actual truths but overall, the book is a well detailed and excellently written fictional action story, and if you read, like me you will not be able to put it down for long!!
