




### Classic Boot Sale Kings Cross 27th Sept

### Woman,s Rugby World Cup 2025

The 2025 Women's Rugby World Cup this year was the tenth edition of the Women's Rugby World Cup, the quadrennial world championship for national rugby union teams, organised by World Rugby.









The competition was held across various stadiums between 22 August and 27 September 2025. The opening game took place at the Stadium of Light in Sunderland where the amazing singer Anne Marie headlined the opening ceremony. The opening match between England and the United States saw the highest attendance of any to that date in Women's Rugby World Cup history, with a crowd of 42,273.

At the gripping final game in Twickenham, in front of an enthusiastic and buzzing sellout audience of some 81800, now setting the global record! the amazing strong, competitive and worthy England team won the tournament/competition, beating Canada 33–13.

This was the second women's Rugby Union World Cup to be hosted by England, after the 2010 competition, and the fourth to be hosted in Great Britain. The tournament now being expanded from 12 to 16 teams. New Zealand had entered the tournament as defending champions following their victory against England in the 2021 Rugby World Cup final. They were eliminated in the semi-finals in an enthralling game by Canada, who became the first team to beat them at a World Cup in 11 years.

Yet again another classy top level sporting tournament by another inspiring British team!

### Ryder Cup Autumn 2025

A bit of background history to this huge and popular event...

Samuel Ryder (1858 – 1936) was an English businessman, entrepreneur, golf enthusiast, and promoter. He originated the idea of selling garden seeds in "penny packets" and built a very successful business on that concept. Based in St Albans he ran the business from his terraced house in Folly Lane until he moved into much larger premises -The Old Seed Hall in nearby Holywell Hill, by then employing 100+ in a very successful operation. The Old Seed Hall is still in St Albans now as Café Rouge



At the age of around 50, Sam Ryder became an enthusiastic golfer and from 1923 to 1925 he, together with his brother James, started sponsoring a number of golf tournaments and matches mostly at his home club of Verulam near <u>St</u> Albans. In early 1926 the idea for a match between British and American professional golfers was proposed. Sam Ryder became involved stepping in and sponsoring the event. It had been his intention that this match would be the first Ryder Cup but it was decided that the match would not be an official contest. The first official event, for which Ryder donated a gold trophy, did not take place until <u>1927</u>.





The Trophy that was created and presented, was made by Mappin and Webb of London and cost around £300.00.

### The Annual Armistice Day 11/11/25 - remembers:

This annual and moving ceremony, held at the cenotaph includes a two-minute silence - one minute for those who fell during conflict and one minute for those who returned, forever changed, is one of those "stop and think of how lucky we are" moments of the year when perspectives realign and the precariousness of life is made all the more evident, for all to reflect on.......

"Armistice" is Latin for "to stand (still) arms"

The Armistice was the agreement to end the fighting of the First World War and begin peace negotiations. It began at 11am on 11 November 1918.





For this very reason, at 11am every year on 11 November, we take a moment to commemorate. It is a day to remember the soldiers that died across the world between 1914 and 1918 - including those who died between Armistice and the end of the First World War, as well as honouring servicemen and women of every service and conflict from the first world war to more recent conflicts...

This moving and very beautiful poem I stumbled across was written by Neil Andrew for a competition in remembrance of all the animals that served without choice in War. It didn't get short listed, however it has over two million reads on Facebook and has been read out at numerous memorial services in UK, Canada, Australia and more, so please read and reflect:

I spoke to you in whispers
As shells made the ground beneath us quake
We both trembled in that crater
A toxic muddy bloody lake

I spoke to you and pulled your ears
To try and quell your fearful eye
As bullets whizzed through the raindrops
And we watched the men around us die

I spoke to you in stable tones
A quiet tranquil voice
At least I volunteered to fight
You didn't get to make the choice

I spoke to you of old times
Perhaps you went before the plough
And pulled the haycart from the meadow
Far from where we're dying now

I spoke to you of grooming
Of when the ploughman made you shine
Not the shrapnel wounds and bleeding flanks
Mane filled with mud and wire and grime

I spoke to you of courage As gas filled the Flanders air Watched you struggle in the mud Harness acting like a snare

I'll keep your sacrifice alive


I spoke to you of legacy

Some sad news to report:

#### **Hugh Pryce Lewis**

It is with great sadness that I write to advise the passing away in October of one of our esteemed and loved members - Hugh Lewis.

Huw (as he preferred) had been with the club since the early days and was a regular attendee at all the shows and meet ups we organise. He will be remembered by members for his complete encyclopaedic knowledge of all things engineering and the micro level of detail he would happily discuss as long as you liked was always fascinating. His two cars regularly displayed at our shows – both Wolseley's, a 1934 car, and 1932 Wolseley Hornet Special were magnificent machines and were driven almost daily! An Engineer through and through, his life career being in Electrical Engineering. After completing his degree in Electrical Engineering, he worked for some time in R&D at Brush Transformers in Walthamstow subsequently moving to work as a field Engineer in power engineering with CEGB (National Grid) in Willesden where he remained until his retirement.

His family originated from Wales, and he was completely dedicated with all things Welsh speaking the language fluently and spending as much time as possible on the Gower ,although he lived locally in the family home in Southgate for all his life.

His Engineering skills knew no bounds, from restoration of longcase clocks, of which he had a few! to his love of Railways leading him into building a huge and very complex railway layout in his loft conversion. However even more astonishing, he and his best friend Richard acquired a couple of steam engines and restored them to full running order. One went to the Pontypool and Blaenavon railway and the other went to Mangapps farm, where at Christmas, Hugh would do what was known as 'The Mince Pie Run' – taking children on his steam train to see Father Christmas.

He also loved motorcycles and had some magnificent examples over the years

His many other and loved pastimes include walking and Sailing. When he was introduced to this some years ago, he gained his yacht-masters certification as a Skipper and subsequently bought and restored a sailing yacht "the good ship Cleo "which he absolutely loved, sailing this out of Bradwell on the Essex coast for many years.

Visits to Poland and all things related became another passion as a result of his long-standing friendship with ,and eventual life partner Eva. In 2014, when Hugh was a spritely 71, he married Eva. Meeting Eva changed Hugh for the best and they had some wonderful years together, visiting their friends on Hugh's motorbikes, travelling to Holland on the yacht for holidays and seeing Eva's family in Poland. Hugh became a big fan of all things Polish, especially loving the people,the food and the odd couple of local alcoholic beverages! Sadly, too soon, Eva developed cancer, leaving Hugh a widower in 2016.

We were invited to attend his funeral, held on 3/11/25, by his lovely God daughter Sophie, and so Derrick, Chris and I attended gladly representing all BCCC members and all who were close friends with him. His gentlemanly quiet manner, good humour and good grace will be missed by all at BCCC.
